Simon Creighton specialises in prison law, working particularly with life sentenced prisoners. He has a considerable case load of public law challenges and applications to the European Court of Human Rights.

Abigail Smith - Barrister, Garden Court. Abigail practises primarily in public law, specialising in asylum, immigration, prison law and related areas. She regularly appears in statutory appeals in the First-Tier Tribunal and the Upper Tribunal, as well as in judicial review applications in the Administrative Court. These appeals involve both asylum issues and a wide range of publicly and privately funded immigration matters. She is recommended for immigration

in Chambers UK (2014) and Legal 500 (2013). Abigail also practises in prison law where her work includes judicial reviews, hearings before the Parole Board and advising prisoners on a wide range of matters.
